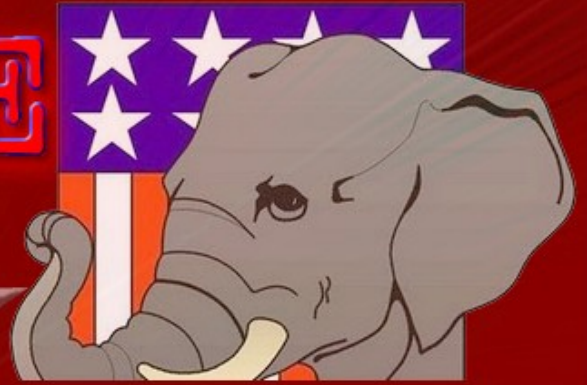

Tom Arnone Profile

A true son of the Borough of Neptune City, Mayor and former Councilman Tom Arnone knows about running local government efficiently and effectively to enhance the lives of his fellow residents. If his campaign for a seat on the Monmouth County Board of Chosen Freeholders is successful, he hopes to take his proven experience to the next level.

“Over 15 years in office, I have accomplished a lot of my goals,” Mayor Arnone said in mid-October. “I think I could be an added positive voice to the board, and to the county Republican Party. My candidacy has gotten a very good reception, which is quite encouraging. People are very responsive.” Well-known in his hometown, Tom has made a name for himself among officials and politicians countywide. They call him, “a good

guy” who would be an asset to the Freeholder Board, which currently has 3-2 Republican majority. Two seats are in play for voters on November 2, one held by Democrat John D’Amico of Oceanport and the other by Republican Robert Clifton of Matawan, running for his second three-year term on the board. Spring Lake Councilwoman Janice Venables is running on the Democratic ticket with Mr. D’Amico.

Neptune City Mayor since 2004, Tom, 47, has been married to his wife Catherine for 26 years. They have one daughter, Lauren. A graduate of Neptune High School, Tom attended Brookdale Community College. He has owned and operated T. Arnone’s Landscaping since 1983.

“I had a great upbringing and my entire close family, including my parents Tom and Camille, my three siblings, my daughter and in-laws are very supportive of my candidacy,” Tom said. The elder Mr. Arnone owns Tom Arnone Plumbing & Heating in Neptune City. A youth soccer coach for many years, Mayor Arnone said his years in youth sports have been very rewarding.

“I have been so involved with youth and have tremendous support from them,” Tom said. “They have been very receptive of my candidacy because we have done so much together over the years. That has affected my personality and helped me in dealing with the many challenges of government.”

In Neptune City, Tom is Director of the Office of Emergency Management and is a member of the Land Use Board, the Board of Recreation and the Neptune City Alliance to Prevent Alcohol and Drug Abuse. He has served on the Environmental Committee and was a delegate to the Community Development Block Grant. Previously a Vice President of the New Jersey Conference of Mayors, Tom is currently President of that organization. He is also an active member of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities and serves on its Legislative and Resolutions Committees.

During his tenure in Neptune City, the borough built a community center, which is used by senior citizens for meetings, parties and bingo. Adams Field was completely renovated with open space grants, as was Memorial Park overlooking the Shark River, where a pavilion was constructed with grant funding.

Redevelopment of areas of the commercial district are also happening under Tom’s tenure. The troublesome Charlene Motel on Steiner Avenue, a “dangerous site that had a lot of police activity,” was closed, Tom said. The East Coast Ice building, vacant under an absentee owner over 15 years who owned back taxes, was demolished at no taxpayer expense with a \$500,000 grant. The borough is working with property owners and developers to invigorate those areas. All 12 miles of roads in the borough, including sidewalks and curbs have been refurbished, mostly through grants.

“Everywhere I go while campaigning, there are only two things people talk about – lower taxes and smaller government,” Tom said. “It’s amazing. No one wants to talk about anything else. Smaller government will hopefully bring taxes down.” During his years in local government, Tom has worked throughout the county to create collaborative and joint efforts with other mayors and governing bodies. He actively pursues opportunities for shared services and is always looking for areas where duplication of services can be eliminated, or where combined services will improve operations.

“I have set goals for many achievements for the Borough of Neptune City and I have been fortunate enough to reach them,” he continued. “I have taken an aggressive

approach to improve the quality of life for residents while being extremely mindful of the tax rate. I take a look at every line item in my budget to ensure that we are providing the best possible services to our taxpayers while at the same time controlling spending. A firm believer in transparency and accountability, I believe in an open door, approachable, hands-on style. I pride myself on my proactive approach and the ability to use foresight rather than reacting to situations.”

A self-proclaimed “fitness nut,” Tom rises at 4:30 a.m. daily to hit the gym, still plays basketball and remains involved with his daughters’ athletic endeavors. Lauren is Captain of the Red Bank Regional High School Varsity Soccer Team and also plays lacrosse.

“If elected, I will work hard for all citizens of Monmouth County,” Tom summed up. “I want to handle the difficult decisions that must be made with transparency.” The *Trunkline* urges you to vote for Tom Arnone and all worthy candidates on the GOP ticket on November 2, and urge your friends and family to do the same.

Shaun Golden Profile

There was a moment when Colts Neck native Shaun Golden knew he wanted to dedicate his life to law enforcement. He had just been lowered down a narrow, dark hole to successfully rescue a six-year-old girl from a well near where Colts Neck High School is now located. It was 1993. Now, 17 years later, Acting Monmouth County Sheriff Golden commands 600 employees and oversees a wide variety of public safety activities, drawing on a wealth of law enforcement experience.

Sheriff Golden has been heading up the department for the past nine months, after being tapped for the post when former County Sheriff Kim Guadagno became New Jersey’s first Lieutenant Governor. He was selected for the position for his many years’ experience in varied aspects of law enforcement and public safety, as well as his breadth of knowledge regarding internet technology and its modern police applications. As soon

as he assumed the Sheriff's position, he began incorporating proven computerized services to provide more efficient, reliable service and save taxpayers money. He now feels he's in the position he has worked toward his entire 25-year career, and hopes to build on what he's begun if re-elected on November 2.

"At the end of the day, in our post-9-11 world, we need someone with experience, especially in emergencies, blackouts, etcetera," Sheriff Golden said on October 28. "We comprise and coordinate a large number of first responders. Their leader must be able to coordinate all resources." From his early years as an Emergency Medical Technician, his time as a volunteer firefighter with Colts Neck Fire Company #2, to the seven years he spent directing chaotic traffic in Toms River, Sheriff Golden knows, and knows how to work with, the spectrum of emergency personnel in the county and beyond. He worked as a certified paramedic in Monmouth and Ocean counties, has a Masters Degree in public administration from Seton Hall University and is a New Jersey certified Public Manager. He recently completed courses and earned certification in Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

While with the Toms River Police Department, Sheriff Golden revamped that department's telephone, radio and dispatch operations using modern computer technology. His success upgrading that 9-11 system prompted then Sheriff Guadagno to invite him to repeat the process at the county level, where he became an Undersheriff.

"I always wanted to come back to that area," Sheriff Golden said. "I've worked with other agencies in Monmouth County. We're still working on major upgrades in the county's Communication Center that will take us to the next level." Part of that effort is providing dispatch, K-9 and other county-run services for municipalities that can no longer afford to maintain them at the local level. Sheriff Golden has been expanding and creating new shared service arrangements throughout his tenure.

"More and more towns will have to merge these types of services," Sheriff Golden said, adding significant funds have been saved through electronic data storage. "At the county, we are expanding our specialized services as the towns are constricting theirs." Internet safety, mail fraud, identify theft, and medical emergency cards for senior citizens are all part of the department's efforts to protect citizens. The department conducts a SEEK (Sheriff's Emergency Education for Kids) 9-1-1 program, which teaches first graders how to use the 9-1-1 emergency number, On October 12, the program set a record by reaching the 35,000th participant. Sheriff's officers also issues youth identification cards.

The Monmouth County 9-1-1 Communications Center, staffed with 65 public safety tele-communicators, provides a high level of 9-11 services to 44 municipalities, dispatches for nine police departments, 32 fire departments and 24 first aid squads. Through Sheriff Golden's efforts, grants were obtained to add two police dogs to the county's canine unit, which are shared with the municipalities at no cost to taxpayers.

"Our K-9 unit has worked in 22 county municipalities since January," Sheriff Golden said. "We have seized \$33,000 in drug money and successfully conducted some big busts with our dogs." Sheriff Golden likes to share what he has learned. For the past five years, he's been an adjunct professor of public policy and political science at Monmouth University. He is married and has two sons.

Internally, Sheriff Golden has used attrition and retirements to leave eight positions in his department unfilled, saving about \$1.7 million in salaries and benefits.

Overtime accrued by corrections officers is an ongoing concern, and a priority for the sheriff. He said he has reduced overtime and continues to work on that issue. Sheriff Golden is especially proud of the department's new volunteer program, which trains civilian personnel to conduct community law enforcement programs and initiatives, freeing officers to tackle their more specialized duties in light of reduced personnel rosters.

"This year, we have gone on an aggressive volunteer recruitment program so that we can continue to man booths at local and county fairs, as well as appear in the schools," Sheriff Golden said. "We're reducing costs in our community programs while continuing the important services that increase public safety and awareness." "I feel people recognize we're showing fiscal responsibility and streamlining services," Sheriff Golden said. "Everyone points to shared services, but in terms of accomplishment, our expansion into internet technology, expanding our K-9 unit and taking on dispatch services for an increasing number of municipalities shows our leadership in that area.. Between my law enforcement career and my classes at Monmouth University, I'm up-to-date on all changes in technology and public policy. I support Governor Christie's Tool Kit. I am working on issues in the Sheriff's Department where we can improve."

Readers can readily see why a vote for Shaun Golden is a vote for proven law enforcement experience. It is also a vote for someone who strives to learn and incorporate the most up-to-date technological advances to fight crime, increase efficiency and save taxpayer dollars.
